### • Greeting



Say hello to people who live near you. Greeting people is the first step to becoming friends. The more often you greet people, the easier it will be for them to open up to you.

#### • Noise (Loud noises)

Do not be noisy or make loud noises, especially in apartments or condominiums, as it will disturb the people living nearby. Be especially careful about noise in the middle of the night.

- · Please do not speak in a loud voice.
- Please do not listen to music or watch TV with the volume set too loud.
- Please do not run around inside the house.
- Please do not have a party and sing and dance.
- Please do not play a guitar or other instruments.



#### Garbage

In Japan, garbage is separated when it is disposed of. Each community has its own rules regarding garbage disposal, including when, how to separate it, and where to dispose of it. If you don't know the rules, or if they are too difficult to understand, please ask the local government or your neighbors.

Separating Garbage

• Separate by type of garbage.

Common types of garbage (examples)

Burnable Garbage  Burnable and combustible garbage	Food waste from the kitchen and paper waste, etc.	THE CONTRACT OF THE PARTY OF TH
Non-burnable Garbage Garbage which should not be burned, incombustible garbage	Broken plates, cups, metal, glass, etc.	
Recyclable garbage	Bottles, cans, PET bottles, newspapers, books, plastic containers, cardboard, etc.	MILK
Oversized garbage	Furniture such as tables and chairs, bicycles, futons, air conditioners, TVs, refrigerators, etc.	

#### Disposing of Garbage



- What day of the week and by what time should I put out the garbage?
- What kinds of garbage can you throw away?
- Where should I put out the garbage?
- \* There are different days of the week and places to dispose of different types of garbage.
- ※ In some areas, you should buy and use specially marked garbage bags.
  Your local store will likely sell the garbage bags for your locality.

In some areas, there are apps that can be viewed in multiple languages. Please search for "Garbage Separation App". Inuyama City has an app called "ThreeR".



# "Were there any surprises that were different from your image of Japan before coming here?"

Huy: Before coming to Japan, I studied Japanese for about four months and thought that I would be fine, but when I came to Japan, I couldn't understand a word of conversation.

Thuong Thuong: When I came to Japan, I was surprised to see that Kanji is used everywhere. Also, I found conversation does not always seem to follow the grammar I had learned, so I could not even understand what the other person was saying.

Triet: I didn't expect to work so late. In Vietnam, we go home at five o'clock but people work until ten o'clock here in Japan. It was surprising.

Tai: I thought everyone is rich in Japan but not everyone was so. That is the same as it is in Vietnam. I was surprised the long hours I had to work in a day, and I was also

Yang: I thought everywhere in Japan was a city like in Tokyo, but it wasn't. Also I was surprised at how many categories garbage needs to be sorted into.

surprised at how hard Japanese people work.

Tai: I came to Japan after passing Level 4 of the Japanese-Language Proficiency Test, but I found it was difficult to catch how Japanese people speak the language.

Yang: I've been in Japan for more than 8 years now, but I still can't speak Japanese very well. During work, I cannot interact freely, so I don't have many opportunities to talk with Japanese people.

Triet: Even if you study it, sometimes the meaning doesn't make sense when you speak.

Tsuji: Maybe there are things that we don't understand about each other because of the differences in customs and cultures.
