

About Living in Japan

With every issue we will feature a topic that you need to know about. We will interview the right person for each topic.

What you need to know about living in Japan

In Japan, there are rules and systems likely somewhat different from those of your country. Here in Japan we share the costs of child-raising, medical care, and old-age security. In order to live in Japan you need to know the rules and regulations of Japan and follow the requirements for paying taxes and other procedures. If you neglect those required procedures and do not pay taxes, you may have to pay a penalty or face serious consequences. Below is some information that may help you lead a successful life in Japan.



①Procedure for Notification of Moving-in Within 14 days

- When you submit your notification of moving-in [転入届 *tennyu todoke*] to Inuyama City, a resident record will be created in your name.
- You need to be registered in order to be able to enrol your children in public schools, apply for the National Health Insurance, or recieve any other public services.

$\langle \langle What to bring to the City Office \rangle \rangle$

① Passport

② Residence Card or Special Permanent Resident

Certificate

③ Proof of relationship with the head of your family such as birth or marriage certificate in both the original language and in Japanese ※ Once your new residence status has been recorded, your "My Number" (Individual Number) is automatically generated. It will take 2 to 4 weeks for delivery to your home.

%My Number is a 12-digit number that is allotted to residents of Japan.

②Procedure to Apply for National Health Insurance

- You can see a doctor anywhere in Japan without worrying about the cost if the medical procedure is covered by National Health Insurance, a system to help pay medical costs when you are ill or injured.
- · People who are not insured through their workplace or through the medical insurance system



for the elderly aged 75 or over are required to be insured through National Health Insurance. Premiums are paid in ten installments per year.

XYour insurance certificate will be sent by mail. Please make sure your residence has a mailbox clearly showing your name.

3What is the National Pension?

- The National Pension will support you in your old age.
- Current workers pay premiums so that elderly people can receive benefits.
- All residents of Japan between 20 and 59 years old, irrespective of their nationality, must join the National Pension System and pay monthly premiums (excluding employee pension subscribers and their spouses).
- X If you have difficulties paying your premiums, you may be able to get an exemption or reduction under certain conditions. Please contact the Health Insurance and National Pension Division of the City Office.
- Within 2 to 3 months after you apply for enrollment in the National Pension, a payment notice will be sent to you from the Japan Pension Service. You can pay your premiums at convenience stores and at financial institutions. You can also pay by bank transfer or by credit card.

(4)Residence Tax

• The residence tax is used to support public services, such as garbage collection,

education, welfare, public facilities, and provide administrative services, and so forth. You are required to pay both municipal and prefectural residence taxes.

• The residence tax is based on your previous year's income.

<u>* These taxes are not negotiable, although some relief may be available in some circumstances. Please consult with the Tax</u> Division.

<Topics About Children>

6Child Allowance

- A child allowance is available to parents or guardians of children up through graduation from junior high school.
 - Under 3 years old-15,000 yen
 - 3 years old to the end of elementary school-10,000 yen
 - Junior high school age-10,000 yen
- *These are monthly amounts for each child.

After their second child families receive 15,000 yen

for each child from the age of 3 to the end of elementary school.

Ochild Medical Expenses

Children who have a home address in Inuyama City and who are enrolled

in Japanese Health Insurance are eligible for free medical services.

Free until graduation from junior high school

Partial reimbursement from high school entrance to graduation

XJunior high school coverage applies until the March 31st following a child's 15th birthday.

*High school coverage applies until the March 31st following a child's 18th birthday.

⑧Applying for Nursery School [保育園 hoikuen] and Kodomo Miraien (a combined nursery and kindergarten)

• If a single parent needs child care (or if both parents do) because of work or for other reasons, children are generally eligible to enroll in nursery school or Kodomo Miraien. Tuition is based on the parent's (or both parents') income.

(9)Elementary School and Junior High School Enrollment


- If you want to have your child go to elementary or junior high school in Inuyama, enrollment is open all year.
- Compulsory Education in Japan

Elementary school: 6 years (age 6 to 12)

Junior high school: 3 years (after graduating from elementary school and up to age 15)

• A support system is available for low-income parents. It partially covers lunch [kyushoku] fees and some other school fees (an application must be submitted).

When you decide to stop using water service due to relocation or to request a change of user name, please notify the Water Works Customer Center [*Suidou Okyakusama Senta*] in advance. This service can be requested by phone.

\bigcirc Preparing your water pipes for winter \bigcirc

•Beware of Nighttime Temperature Drops!

When the temperature drops below minus 4 degrees Celsius, pipes are more likely to freeze or burst unless preventative measures are taken. The following are some typical instances where this may happen.

- 1 If pipes remain bare
- 2 If the pipes are located on the northern side of a house
- 3 If the pipes are located in a direct wind

•How to Keep Your Pipes Warm

① Wrap the faucet and pipe in an anti-freeze material right up to the spout to prevent the freezing and bursting of the pipe.



② Wrap the faucet and pipe in a towel or a piece of blanket (anything on hand) in the same manner. Then make a binding cover with plastic wrap or a plastic bag.



③Stuff the water meter box with pieces of fabric or a cut blanket and cover the meter box with a piece of cardboard to prevent freezing.

*Make sure to keep the meter readable.



•What to do if a water pipe bursts

Turn off the water source (stopcock) within the meter box (located outside) and then call the plumbing contractors for Inuyama City at the number below.

*Repair cost will be at your expense.

•What to do if the pipes freeze and no water comes out

Cover the frozen area with a towel and pour lukewarm water over it to melt the ice gradually. If you use boiling water,

there is a danger of creating cracks in the pipe or causing them to burst, so please be careful.


1 Tax Payment

Residents in Japan must fulfill their tax obligations. There are several categories of taxation: City and Prefectural Residents Tax, Light Vehicle Tax, Nursing Care Insurance Tax, and so forth. When the amount of tax has been determined a payment slip will be sent to the taxpayer. When you receive the payment slip, pay the tax by the tax due date. If you miss the tax due date you will incur a late payment charge.

2 How to pay your taxes.

- 1 payment can be made at a convenience store or at financial institutions using the payment slip.
- 2 Direct withdrawal from your bank account is also available.

[How to apply for account transfer (direct withdrawal) from your bank account]



In order to apply for automatic transfer, fill in the blanks on the account transfer request form and bring the form to the financial institution that is designated by Inuyama City.

This completes the application procedure for account transfer.
